Greetings!

One of the joys of each new year is seeing the snowdrops begin to push through the ground and then start to blossom. It is always a welcome sign that another winter is coming to an end and that spring is on its way. There then seems to be a gap – maybe simply because we have waited several months for this moment and our anticipation takes time to reawaken – before the next flowers appear but, sure enough, before too long crocuses and daffodils make their colourful presence felt, themselves to be succeeded by bluebells and wild garlic.

Anyone who has walked through Cumbernauld Glen during the first few months of the year will be well aware of the changing seasons, as the banks of white flowers suddenly appear as if from nowhere, then become banks of glorious yellow and then, as at the time this letter is being written, become banks of blue.

There is change, but it follows a pattern. There might be a predictability about it, but nevertheless it is still wonderful to behold and see it all happen before our eyes. We just need to take time to appreciate the marvellous rhythm, the sequence, of creation as it unfolds around us.

The Christian Church, too, has had its own calendar for many years and, whether or not we adhere to it rigidly, one can see the unfolding (perhaps 'revelation' might be a better expression) of God's plan for creation, and humanity in particular. It's a plan no less wonderful and marvellous than the changing seasons, and Jesus Christ is right at the heart of it. We need to take time, make time, to fully appreciate its pattern, its scope, its glory.

It starts with a promise: that God will come and save God's people.

Advent helps us prepare for the arrival of the One in whom and through whom that promise will be fulfilled. The short season of Christmas is a joyous explosion when the Christ-child is announced to all, and that is followed by Epiphany, that 'a-ha' season as the light begins to dawn as to who Jesus is and why he came. However, it also brings the realisation that not everyone will welcome Jesus' message of uncompromising love. As Jesus prepares his followers for his inevitable death, the season of Lent is a time of preparation where we get to see where and how it will all end.

In a few short months of each year the rhythm, the pattern, of God's plan is revealed, with all its (for us) highs and lows. And yet the story hasn't ended. The agony of the cross, love laid bare for all to see, Christ's death, is that which gives us new life, new hope. On the third day after his crucifixion and burial, Christ was raised to life. Winter becomes spring, death becomes life and, although we repeat this pattern every year in our churches, it still never ceases to amaze, never fails to be a cause for immense gratitude.

This letter is being written on Ascension Day. A few days from now the Church will celebrate Pentecost, that day when the Holy Spirit came upon the believers gathered together in Jerusalem and changed the world for ever. We have seen God's promise delivered; the church is the people through whom God's promise continues to be delivered, day upon day, year in, year out.

God's love is for all, whatever the weather, whatever the season. As the hymn-writer Sarah Betts Rhodes put it:

God, who made all things, On earth, in air, in sea, Who changing seasons brings, Careth for me.

Mission in Action

At our last meeting on 7th March the Mission in Action group focused on one aspect of our draft Mission Plan. This was the establishment of a wellbeing space within the church sanctuary in the Old Parish Church. How can we spotlight this church space as a beacon of hope and wellbeing not only for our current congregation, but also for the people who don't come to church but may need what a caring church community has to offer? What about the many people who are not OK but who would appreciate a local space where 'it's OK not to be OK'?

This is the premise behind the creation of a Renew Wellbeing Cafe and we, the Mission in Action group, are currently investigating the process for establishing one in Cumbernauld Village in our church space. Renew Wellbeing is a nationwide organisation that supports churches towards setting up and sustaining spaces where people can come to experience fellowship, share hobbies, drink tea, eat cake, learn new skills, feel safe, escape isolation, pray. In other words, be in a space where it's OK not to be OK.

We have approached the Renew Wellbeing organisation and, on the 25th May, the six members of the Mission in Action group attended a presentation in Glasgow given by Ruth Rice who established the first Renew Wellbeing Cafe. As a group we found this talk to be very motivational and Ruth, herself, was an inspirational speaker.

We now intend to participate in an online introductory workshop to become better informed as to how we might take forward this missional endeavour within our own church space. We will also visit a Renew Wellbeing Cafe that is run by an ecumenical group of churches within Glasgow Presbytery.

This is not a fanciful proposal but a real wish by your Mission in Action group to provide a space that could make a difference to people living in our community and that, we believe is, indeed, meaningful mission. We look forward to keeping you updated as we become better informed and hopefully realise a major aspect of our Mission Plan.

You are warmly invited to remain in church after morning worship for tea and coffee and for the Annual Stated Meeting on Sunday 23rd June.



Union update

After morning worship on Sunday 28th April, a representative from Glasgow Presbytery officiated at the voting process on the proposed union between Cumbernauld Old and Kildrum / St Mungo's.

The proposal was approved by 45 votes to 9.

However, the vote taken at St Mungo's on the same day went the other way and the proposal was defeated.

This means that the proposed union as laid out in the current Basis of Union document will not now go ahead as originally planned.

At the time of printing (12th May), the situation and the way forward is unclear. Rev James Gemmell will continue in discussions with Glasgow Presbytery to bring forward a new proposal for consideration and we will of course keep the congregation fully informed as things change. In the meantime, it's business as usual.

Food Bank Update

Thank you to everyone for their continued support, not least for the amazing response to our Easter Egg Appeal. It was particularly pleasing to see so many 'Real Easter Eggs' at this year's event. Of the millions of Easter eggs sold every year, only the Real Easter Egg is made from Fairtrade chocolate and has an Easter story book in the box. (See the picture on our Fairtrade report elsewhere in the newsletter.)

The food bank continues to open each Thursday morning in the Session House and numbers have crept up a little in recent weeks with 3-4 people being the current average. People are finding it hard to cope with the cost of living – especially energy costs.

The Village food bank reopened after Covid in late April 2023 and by the end of this April we will have given out over 130 food parcels and made lots of cups of tea and coffee. As mentioned before, those attending appear to value a warm, welcoming space at least as much as the practical help.

In addition to groceries, toiletries and household cleaning items are distributed approximately once a month. We remain grateful to Kay at Pets Pantry for providing pet food as required.

Look out for details of our Harvest Appeal in the autumn. And finally, heartfelt thanks to all our supporters and cheerful volunteers. You really make a difference!

News from South Africa - Easter 2024

Dear Friends,

Easter has come and gone as did Christmas in a buzz of activity since our last letter. The year ended off busily. The Council on Higher Education asked Graham to do a number of evaluations for programmes hoping to be introduced this year. Then there was end of year external marking for UNISA, the College of the Transfiguration and the University of Venda and three doctoral theses for the University of Pretoria, in addition to normal marking at the Baptist College. However, we did manage to squeeze in a trip to the UK though we didn't get further than Brighton. Sandra's widowed sister, Louise, whom we hadn't seen for over twenty years, came to visit us with her grandson, Christopher, so that took up our time. It was great catching up.

Then back to South Africa in time for the Baptist college graduation – always a high-powered event with lots of ululating and calling out: 'That's my beautiful wife!'; 'That's my child!' Another year has begun and we have ended the first term. Then Graham is to teach an Honours module in the History of Christian Theology in April. We are hoping to restart the undergraduate programme at St Augustine's in the second semester.

The National Research Foundation work was delayed last year and only happened in February due to the installation of a new system which had a number of problems, The work was increased as Graham was asked to take on the Historical Studies panel in addition to the two Religious and Theological Studies panels, which meant more reading and writing!

In the midst of this, our son, David, came for a fortnight's visit which took us to Sun City with friends, Stanley and Tshego for a relaxing couple of days. >>>

Just before that, Graham was teaching our probationers on Post Academic Training and we ended up that evening with twelve guests for a braai and Bible Study.

Other than that, church work has kept him busy. The vacancy at Trinity: Lynnwood went well and the congregation called a probationer, Graham Fryer, whose grandparents we knew well. That was resolved in February and Graham was inducted at the beginning of March. Then, at the same Presbytery meeting, Graham was appointed Interim Moderator to our congregation at St Mark's, also here in Pretoria. It is a poorer, elderly, but enthusiastic congregation which is not able to call a full-time minister, so other alternatives will have to be sought.

Graham has also submitted his manuscript on the History of the Presbyterian Church of Southern Africa for consideration. Now he has just finished a book chapter he was asked by an international publisher to write on Church of Scotland mission in Africa from 1945 to the present. It was a sad and painful experience to learn that the Church of Scotland mission has come to a virtual end after centuries of committed outreach throughout the world by generations of faithful missionaries.

The Mamelodi project continues; we are delighted that we have been able to get 13 children into full time education this year. With your generosity and our sons in Brighton continuing to support the work, we are confident that we shall be able to also provide monthly groceries to the child-headed families in addition so far for most of the year.

At the invitation from Mamelodi congregation David and Sandra went to the Palm Sunday service where David handed out Easter eggs to the Sunday School children and was then asked to address the congregation. >>>

A young woman came to thank us personally – she has been accepted for university and told us that all her education to this point had been sponsored by your donations. We felt so proud of this achievement she is now the 3rd person to reach tertiary education through the project.

We have sent some photos from Mamelodi (and a couple of videos) and hopefully they'll be attached to the email that comes with this letter.

We hope you had a wonderful Easter?


Mission Circle

Fairtrade Group report



The Fairtrade group has continued to run a monthly mini-stall on the last Sunday of each month after the service with teas, coffees and Fairtrade home-baking served in Church.

As we intimated in our last magazine article, our Fairtrade stall has been reduced in range to the items we feel are most popular with the congregation. We will continue to offer ethically traded goods at the most reasonable price we can acquire them.

To celebrate Easter we offered to the congregations of Cumbernauld Old and Kildrum + St Mungo's the opportunity to purchase Real Easter eggs from the Meaningful Chocolate Company. These eggs are made from Fairtrade chocolate and include an illustrated storybook which tells children (and adults) about the Easter story, thereby sharing the true significance of Easter as a Christian celebration. We were gratified by the uptake of this offer and in total 78 Real Easter Eggs were purchased, many of which were donated to Cornerstone Church for distribution to young people who might not otherwise receive an Easter egg.

A Wee Contemplation Over Coffee or Tea

Sometimes I hear people say, "Help, I am out of my depth and in unfamiliar surroundings. However, I have brought you to this place so that I can mould

you and shape you and prepare you for a new season of fruitfulness." (Heaven Sent, Wisdom from the Father's Heart. Dave & Jenny Gilpin).

'Fear not, for I have redeemed you. I have called you by name and you are mine.' Isaiah 43. v1


If I could ever rewrite this verse, it would include *your* name at the very start. This is how God looks upon us, He loved us before creation, He loves us all personally; He knows everything about us, He cares. All he asks from us is to trust in Him alone and submit to His will.

This brings to mind a story in the Old Testament of Esther, a young Jewish girl, who, after losing her parents is adopted by her cousin Mordecai and lives in his house. At this time, the King of Persia, Ahasuerus, divorces his wife Vashti and eventually decides to look for a new queen. When he meets Esther, he is besotted and makes her his new Queen. The King's advisor, Haman, is evil, possibly jealous, and turns the King against the Jewish people, managing to get the King to sign a decree for the murder of all of the Jewish race.

Esther, full of faith and courage, asks Mordecai to fast and pray for three days as she has decided to visit and ask the King to save her people from death. Mordecai thinks this is very unwise and he is worried for her, but Esther thinks only of saving her people and places her own life at risk by asking him. Esther explains to the King that Haman is behind these arranged murders and the King, in love with Esther, grants her request. Haman is executed and all the Jewish people survive.

Esther ultimately shows us a picture of Jesus. In this story, we see how God saves His people through Esther's intercession. She was the only one willing to approach the king, risking her own life. She stands in place of the rest of the Jews, and pleads for their salvation. >>> God has plans for you...
The people around you matter...
God is Sovereign...
God is always at work behind the scenes...
God has placed us where we are for a reason.
